



The Missions of Mercy (MOM) Project

Multiple locations throughout Virginia

Program Overview

The Missions of Mercy (MOM) Project, originating in Virginia, operates mobile clinics in strategic locations across Virginia, providing preventive, restorative, and surgical dental treatments to more than 4,000 low-income individuals each year. These two- or three-day events take place in locations that are easily accessible to all populations, such as churches, schools, and fairgrounds. The program targets geographic areas with a high, unmet need for dental care.

Program History and Development



After recognizing the large need for high-quality dental care for underserved Virginians, Dr. Terry Dickinson, executive director of the Virginia Dental Association (VDA) created the Missions of Mercy (MOM) Project in 2000 to provide high-quality dental care to underserved Virginians. The first MOM event was held in Wise County, Virginia. The program has since expanded to hold events at 16 different locations across Virginia.

The MOM Project has served as a model for other states looking to implement similar events. To help with this implementation, the Virginia Dental Association Foundation (VDAF) and Virginia Health Care Foundation (VHCF) have produced webcasts to teach interested participants how to plan a MOM event in their own communities. Program Sustainability

- In 2015, the MOM Project received funding from: the Virginia Department of Health, DentaQuest, Obici Healthcare Foundation, Benevis Foundation, Buchanan County Youth, Henry Schein Dental, United Concordia Dental, the VDA, Virginia Dental Services Corporation, Anthem BC/BS, various corporate sponsors, and individual donors.
- The MOM Project partners with: Virginia Commonwealth University School of Dentistry, The Health Wagon, and numerous volunteer dentists, dental hygienists, and dental assistants.
- Funding for the MOM Project is split between: donated professional services and in-kind donations (79%), donations from foundations (8%), state grants (7%), individual donations (2%), events (2%), donations from businesses and associations (1%), and rental fees and reimbursements (1%). It has received over \$250,000 in donations of supplies.
- This program is staffed by volunteer dentists, dental hygienists, dental assistants, dental and dental hygiene students, and community volunteers. Over 23,000 volunteers have been involved across all Virginia MOM events.
- The total annual budget of the MOM Project in 2015 was \$1,152,672, which included the value of donated professional services.

Program Impact

- To date, the MOM Project has provided 299,740 dental procedures to over 59,000 individuals through the 85 projects completed in Virginia since 2000. The monetary value of these free dental services was \$38.3 million.
- For every \$1 raised, this program provides \$32 of dental care, resulting in average savings of \$2.25 million per year.
- Surveys have demonstrated high client satisfaction with MOM as measured by less pain as a result of the care
 provided, willingness to recommend the MOM project to friends and family, and more ease in eating and speaking.
- The MOM Project was awarded the 2015 Governor's Volunteerism and Community Service Award for a Community
 Organization. Virginia's MOM events have also broken records for the largest two- and three-day dental outreach
 clinics ever conducted in the United States.
- 29 states across the United States have successfully replicated the MOM Project.
