Program Overview

The West Virginia Association of Free & Charitable Clinics (WVAFCC) provides free medical and dental care to low-income adults in West Virginia. WVAFCC is a nonprofit organization with 10 member clinics. It exists to advocate for the free clinics and the individuals they serve, to secure funding sources necessary to treat the individuals served by the free clinics' programs, and to assist free clinics with transitions and issues that impact all free clinics in West Virginia.

Program History and Development



WVAFCC was founded in 2001 to advance and promote access to health care for medically underserved West Virginians who lack insurance. Recognizing the connection between oral health and overall health, WVAFCC improves the quality of life for the individuals they serve. The 10 clinics are geographically dispersed throughout West Virginia and serve all 55 counties in the state. The clinics can treat or refer individuals needing dental care to volunteer dentists involved in the WVAFCC network.

In 2015, the program added 19 new volunteer dentists, and registered dental hygienists contributed 899 more hours than in previous years.

Program Sustainability

- WVAFCC partners with and receives funding from the Highmark Foundation and the Claude Worthington Benedum
 Foundation. In the spring of 2014, WVAFCC received \$150,000 from the Benedum Foundation and \$100,000 from
 the Highmark Foundation for a two-year partnership to expand adult dental treatment and education at its affiliated
 clinics.
- The majority of medical and dental program funding received by member clinics comes from state grants, fundraisers, and donations from the local communities.
- This program is staffed by dentists and registered dental hygienists, some of whom are on staff and some of whom are volunteers.

Program Impact

- In 2015, the 10 member clinics within WVAFCC provided 9,239 dental procedures to 6,171 individuals and oral health education to 14,335 individuals. During this year, volunteer dentists provided \$3,046,684 worth of free dental care.
- In 2013, the member clinics of WVAFCC were the medical home to over 5,443 homeless or high-risk individuals.
- WVAFCC provides care for over 40,000 working poor individuals in West Virginia through the medical and dental services that they provide.
- In 2015, wait time for treatment at the dental clinics decreased to one day from previous wait times of two to four weeks.

"First year project results exceeded WVAFCC expectations. Patient benefits, from the upcoming activation of an on-site dental clinic at Wheeling Health Right (WHR) made possible by second year project funding, will include healthier medical outcomes, increased patient self-esteem, and job acquisition and/or retention for them. Fixing or preventing oral health problems can forestall other health issues, such as hypertension and heart disease, as well."
