



# West Virginia Health Right, Inc. Charleston, West Virginia

#### **Program Overview**

The West Virginia Health Right dental clinic provides dental care to low-income individuals who lack insurance, are underinsured, and are medically underserved. It is the largest and only full-time adult dental clinic in the state. More than 100 dentists and dental specialists volunteer their time to provide dental care and treatment. Individuals must qualify for services based on income and receive services free of charge.

#### **Program History and Development**



West Virginia Health Right was founded in 1982 to provide an ongoing source of health care for low-income and uninsured residents in Charleston, West Virginia. The dental clinic opened in 2001 with a three-chair dental operatory. Individuals must be below 250 percent of the federal poverty level to receive dental services. Since the passage of the Affordable Care Act, services have

been expanded to the Medicaid and Medicare population as well as to low-income Veterans who do not qualify for dental services through the Veterans Administration. West Virginia Health Right has served as a national model for multiple free and charitable clinics.

#### **Program Sustainability**

- West Virginia Health Right receives funding from grants, WV Department of Health & Human Services, and individual donations.
- Funding for the program is split between: state grants (33%), foundation grants (47%), and private donations or fundraisers (20%). The annual budget of the program is \$304,000.
- The program provides services to individuals who are covered by Medicaid or Medicare.
- The program is staffed by over 100 volunteer dentists, oral surgeons, and hygienists.
- In 2005, West Virginia Health Right received a permanent endowment from The Greater Kanawha Way Foundation.
- A fully licensed on-site pharmacy provides medications to individuals free of charge. Additionally, WVRx, the state's
  only charitable mail order pharmacy provides medications and navigation services to 20,000 patients statewide.
   Since implemented in 2008, WVRx has processed over \$85 million in medications to West Virginia's working poor.

#### **Program Impact**

- To date, West Virginia Health Right has provided 150,000 dental procedures to 50,000 individuals.
- A joint research study with the Charleston Area Medical Center has shown that West Virginia Health Right has contributed to a 69 percent decrease in dental visits at the local Emergency Department.
- Surveys have demonstrated high patient satisfaction with West Virginia Health Right, as measured by positive results of dental treatment and the feeling that patient care is equal to those with greater financial means.
- Reports have demonstrated improved health as measured by tracking health status markers such as body mass index, blood pressure, blood glucose levels, and many more.
